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A MESSAGE FROM **OUR SUPERINTENDENT**




Wow, what a year! 2021 was a year for dedication, determination, and resiliency on all fronts here at Blanchard Valley Center - from our providers who have endured staff shortages while working on the front lines to the people and the families we support who have faced struggles of their own.

But, as usual, the staff at BVC worked tirelessly to ensure people's needs were met. Each day we were faced with tribulations, but each and every time we rose to the occasion with a spirit and compassion second to none. Why? Because that's who we are.

Despite the fact that our community and our nation is worn down and weary from the pandemic and its aftermath, that didn't stop BVC from having one of our best years yet.

These are just a few of our accomplishments from 2021:

- We received our accreditation review from the Ohio Department of Development Disabilities and obtained our second consecutive threeyear accreditation – the highest award given to county boards of developmental disabilities.
- BVC launched Project Life at our school. Project Life is a program that prepares transition-age students for life after graduation.
- BVC won "Best of Show" in the annual Findlay Halloween Parade for the fourth consecutive year.
- Chris Clapper was selected to represent the state of Ohio in the Special Olympics USA Games in Florida.
- Dustin Sullivan and Nick Longo have created a podcast called "Hello Hancock!" which has over 40 episodes.
- Governor DeWine appointed Molly Dible and Matthew LaFontaine to serve on the Ohio Developmental Disabilities Council.


TOTAL NUMBER OF PEOPLE SUPPORTED BY BVC

Early Intervention

Helps children from birth through age 2 meet developmental milestones.
178 families currently receive services.

• Meets the developmental needs of children, ages 3-5, with a creative curriculum in our Step Up to Quality, 5-Star pre-school.

• Offers specially designed instruction based on the individual learning needs for students, ages 6-22.

• Provides physical, occupational, and speech therapy for students. Most receive more than one service.

Special Olympics

• Offers 11 sports to 180 athletes, ages 8 and older even if they do not receive BVC services.

Transition Services

Works with students, ages 14-22.
Connects them with resources to prepare for life after graduation, including employment and independent living.

Community Recreation

- Helps people 18 and older participate in community activities.
- •Operating on local dollars, Community Recreation provides more than 110 activities each year.

Providers

- More than 80 agency and independent providers support people in both the home and at work.
- Blanchard Valley Center supports these local providers with \$2.5 million annually for these services.

Services & Support Administration (SSA)

- Provides person-centered supports to people, age 3 and older, by identifying goals, needs, and resources.
- Over 650 people in Hancock County have an SSA.

Approximately \$6.2 million in local taxes are spent on children and adults with developmental disabilities in your community.



2021 REVENUE

In 2021, \$2.5 million was paid to providers working directly with people in Hancock County with developmental disabilities.

In addition, \$6.2 million was spent on children and adults in Hancock County with developmental disabilities.
