

Project LIFE Interns Gain Work and Life Experience

While everyone else in Hancock County was getting ready for the holidays in December, the five interns participating in Project LIFE were focused on a micro-business unit.

Project LIFE is a Blanchard Valley Center program designed to teach individuals with developmental disabilities, ages 18-25, life and living skills.

During the micro-business unit, the interns learned the skills necessary to develop and operate a business. The group brainstormed business names, logos and slogans, landing on Snack Hut as the name of their business. They worked on finding recipes, recording the needed ingredients, shopping for supplies, and following directions to make the treats, which included brownies, cookies and Rice Krispies Treats.

The interns had to price and market the products to Blanchard Valley Center employees. (This was no small feat, as BVC employees are renown snack connoisseurs.) In addition to the snacks, the interns offered coffee, tea and hot chocolate. When it was suggested that dog treats would make a good product, the interns ran with it. They made and sold more than 600 dog treats.

The experience was enjoyable for the interns, who also learned important life skills. If an intern is interested in entrepreneurship, they have the know-how to get started.

Before working on this unit, the interns completed their first 10-week rotation. Two interns worked at Culvers. One of the interns was offered a job cleaning and delivering food to customers after just four weeks.

Three interns worked at Oler's and had the full restaurant experience. They prepped food, bussed tables, seated customers, delivered chips and salsa, worked on the food line,





and made the guacamole. None of the interns had any work experience prior to starting at Oler's. At the end of the rotation, all three were offered jobs. Oler's wanted to create an

"One of the challenges we have for people with developmental disabilities is helping employers understand that these potential hires have skills that extend beyond cleaning positions," said Kelli Grisham, superintendent of Blanchard Valley Center. "Project LIFE helps them to understand that."

The second rotation will include shifts at the Findlay YMCA where interns will assist in a variety of tasks. In the third rotation, which will take place in April-June, the interns will work in a light manufacturing facility. Between this addition and a previous shift at the Findlay-Hancock County Public Library, the interns will have had an array of experiences to put on their resume when they're ready to apply for work.
