The Hancock County activities in March include:

- March 11 Advocacy Day at the Ohio State House. Hancock County advocates will visit with legislators to discuss important issues impacting the DD community.
- March 11-15 Spirit Week. We hope businesses and schools join us to show their support for inclusion. Spirit Week events are: Neon Monday, Y2K Tuesday, Celebrity Wednesday, Rock & Roll Thursday, and Disney Friday.
- March 26 Celebrity Basketball Game. Our Special Olympic basketball players will take on local celebrities at 7 p.m. at Findlay High School. The halftime show will feature an escape artist act.
- The people we support will be reading in elementary schools throughout the county.

NOTES FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT BVC is on the Ballot with a Renewal Levy



Election day is March 19. I encourage you to read up on your candidates and issues before casting your ballot.

The Hanock County Board of Developmental Disabilities/Blanchard Valley Center is on the ballot with the renewal of a 5-year, 2.5 mill levy that generates approximately \$4.4 million annually. Because it is a renewal, it will not increase taxes. This is one of two levies that make up roughly 75-percent of our revenue.

Because of the great support BVC receives from the community, we have not had to ask for new money since 2005 – nearly two decades. In 2023, about \$6.8 million in local taxes were spent on children and adults with developmental disabilities in Hancock County.

Congratulations to Nicole Bowen, the director of Service & Support at BVC, on being named to the inaugural Great Lakes Guardianship Board. This new board was formed to appoint guardians to individuals deemed incompetent by the



court to handle their own affairs in Hancock, Ottawa and Wood counties. This board will help meet a great need. As of September, there were 400 ongoing guardianship cases in Hancock County.

It's DD Awareness Month. We're looking forward to a full slate of activities in March. I hope everyone can attend the Celebrity Basketball Game, as it is one of my favorite events. Everyone has a good time and it exemplifies what inclusion looks like – people integrated and supporting one another. Hancock County Wins State Championship

Hancock County Special Olympics Division V Black Team recently won the state championship at the Ohio Indoor Winter Games.
